From Carpenter to Community Champion

For Gary, the real highlight is when the grandmother looks him in the eye and tells him that his home repairs have allowed her to use a bathtub for the first time in years. farewell to Civic Works, Gary expresses gratitude for the opportunity to serve the community and make a meaningful impact. Johns Hopkins Completes CAPABLE Care Partner Pilot Study: Highlights & Dissemination

With funding from the National Institute on Independent Living, Disability and Rehabilitation Research (NIDLRR), Johns Hopkins' researchers and associates created and tested a prototype of CAPABLE Care Partner as an enhancement to CAPABLE. This prototype was developed through a three-phased approach over four years and incorporated care partners, older adults, clinicians, social workers, and administrators to design and test this enhancement using human-centered design principles. We performed a care partner/caregiver literature review, convened a National Advisory Group, and conducted three rounds of key informant interviews to create a prototype that was then tested in 2023 in three pilot sites. These three sites (Lumeris, MO, Capital Area Agency on Aging, TX, and Meals on Wheels Central TX) were seasoned CAPABLE organizations and had demonstrated leadership and acumen in providing this program.

Methods included review of pre/post assessments of care partners and 360-degree qualitative interviews with more than 40 individuals. Results showed positive effect on care partners and provided real-world insights on how to incorporate a social worker/support specialist into the program. Key take-aways include the value and importance of involving the care partner in CAPABLE visits with clinicians, support for an integrated team approach involving a social worker/support specialist with the CAPABLE clinicians by conducting 1-2 visits with the care partner/participant dyad (with at least one in the home), and connecting the dyad to tailored, local resources.

Through this enhancement, the care partner and the older adult dyad will be better positioned to address current and future needs. They have additional information and skills they can use to connect with social supports/community resources, attend to self-care, and brainstorm how to address current and future needs as they "age in community." Building the capacity and knowledge of the family unit—both participant and care partner—builds a stronger foundation. This supports the ability to self-advocate and remain proactive. This is part of the "secret sauce" of CAPABLE—putting those skills and that knowledge into action following the CAPABLE service.

The CAPABLE Care Partner prototype, including materials, tools, and training modules for clinicians and social worker/support specialists will be available to all CAPABLE sites by early

Fall in 2024. The CAPABLE National Center will make training and tools available to all CAPABLE sites and look forward to supporting organizations across the country as they build the value of their services.
